January & February 2026

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### Sustainable Winter Living For Western BC & NW Washington

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#### Save Energy & Stay Warm

- Seal drafts around windows and doors to keep heat inside.
- Lower thermostats slightly and wear warm layers.
- Open curtains on sunny days and close them at night.
- Heat only rooms in use and close doors to unused spaces.
- Clean furnace or heat-pump filters to improve efficiency.

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#### Use Less Electricity

- Use LED bulbs throughout the home.
- Turn off lights when leaving rooms.
- Unplug electronics or use power bars to reduce standby power.
- Take advantage of daylight hours when possible.

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#### Conserve Water

- Take shorter showers to save water and heating energy.
- Install low-flow showerheads and faucet aerators.
- Fix dripping taps and running toilets promptly.
- Run full loads in dishwashers and washing machines.

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#### Reduce Food Waste & Eat Sustainably

- Choose seasonal and local winter foods when available.
- Plan meals to reduce food waste.
- Freeze leftovers and batch-cook soups or stews.
- Compost food scraps where services exist.

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#### Reduce, Reuse, Recycle

- Donate unwanted items instead of discarding them.
- Recycle electronics, batteries, and light bulbs properly.
- Avoid single-use items; choose reusable alternatives.
- Repair items when possible instead of replacing them.

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#### Choose Sustainable Transportation & Outdoor Living

- Walk, bike, or use transit when weather allows.
- Combine errands to reduce car trips.
- Enjoy low-impact winter activities like walking or snowshoeing.
- Dress for the weather to stay active outdoors.

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#### Support Community & Well-Being

- Support local farmers, markets, and small businesses.
- Share tools, skills, or resources with neighbours.
- Set one achievable sustainability goal for the winter months.
- Spend time outdoors to stay connected to nature during winter.

# Hunger Week Activities

**HUNGER**

**LEARN**

- Invite a community health professional to visit your club and educate members on the prevalence and impact of hunger in your community.

**ACT • BEGINNER**

- Support your local food bank by donating time, equipment or food.
- Create a resource list of hunger-related volunteer opportunities in your region to share with other clubs in your district.
- Use social media to raise awareness about childhood hunger in your community and to inspire others to become involved.
- Host a healthy eating event at your school, community center or place of worship, invite a nutritionist as a keynote speaker.
- Donate nutritious, prepared meals to elderly, disabled or ill community members.
- Sponsor meals at a soup kitchen or homeless shelter.
- Donate to organizations that provide home-nutrient courses to malnourished children.
- Bring a variety of fruits and vegetables to an elementary school class. Explain to the students where the food comes from and encourage them to taste different types of produce.

**ACT • INTERMEDIATE**

- Volunteer with a "gleaning group" to harvest un-picked fruits and vegetables at farms and orchards.
- Host a growing class or market tour where a nutritionist gives participants tips on choosing healthy and nutritious groceries.
- Collaborate with a food bank to organize a community food drive, focusing on collecting items most needed in your area.
- Write a cookbook of transparent, healthy, easy-to-make recipes.
- Work with your local school to provide weekend take-home bags of nutritious snacks for children in need.
- Sponsor a cooking class for youth to learn basic cooking skills for healthy living.
- Create an online resource on planning and performing meals to reduce household food waste.

**ACT • ADVANCED**

- Conduct an assessment of food access in your community. Advocate to local government leaders for additional or improved options in areas of need.
- Support pregnant women and new mothers by ensuring there are comfortable, safe and clean areas for them to nurse in the community.
- Use your professional networks to connect food items to food industry leaders interested in food recovery.
- Develop a program to provide undernourished students with food during holiday times when school is not in session.
- Establish a community or school vegetable garden for residents in a food insecure neighborhood.
- Establish a weekly produce stand in a food desert.
- Create a volunteer transportation program to help individuals and families get to and from grocery stores, food banks and soup kitchens.
- Develop an animal husbandry program where a few families receive a small stock of animals, a portion of the animals offspring will be given to neighboring families for sustainable growth of the program.

Welcome to the application process for the 2026 Northwest Lions Leadership Institute. Congratulations on taking the first step in expanding and honing your leadership skills! The time you spend at the Institute will not only serve you well in Lions, but professionally and personally as well.

#### **Institute Details**

**When: 4 – 7 June 2026**

**Where: Chilliwack, BC**

**Cost:** \$350 US or \$375 CAN (a deposit is required to be submitted with the application).

This covers:

- Three nights lodging at Coast Chilliwack Hotel by APA included at no additional charge.
- Dinner on Thursday, 4 June; Breakfast, lunch, and dinner, 5 & 6 June; Breakfast on 7 June.
- All training materials.

**Applicants from Clubs in MD19 can apply for a special fee waiver, which can reduce the cost of the Institute by \$200.** The application process includes several steps which **all** must be complete and submitted by 1 May 2026:

1. Application data
2. Candidate's Lions history, community service, and goals for attending the Institute
3. Lions Reference Contact Information
4. Deposit \$150 US or \$175 Canadian
5. Fee reduction request **available for Lion members of Multiple District 19 only**

Complete your application:

- *Application form*, which includes application data, the candidate's Lions history, fee reduction request and contact information for your Lions personal reference must be received by 1 May 2026.

\* You can sign this form electronically. Simply click on the signature field and follow the prompts to create a new digital ID (if you have not already created one). Once you have completed the form, save it to your computer and send it as an attachment to the Institute Registrar. **Once you have submitted your application, it cannot be updated and re-submitted.**

The application and deposit need to be sent to the Institute Registrar. Upon receipt of all items, you will be notified of your acceptance into the Institute with instructions for deposit. ## Nanoose Bay Lions Club

In support of Hunger Week of Service, January 3-11, Nanoose Bay Lions Club would like to share the following information written by NBLC Lion Jean Jeffries.

All countries in the world experience hunger and Canada, including Vancouver Island, are no exception. The Nanoose Bay Lions Club became aware of a food need at the Nanaimo Regional General Hospital for their renal patients. NBLC is trying to help by collecting money for fresh food boxes and healthy food donations for the hospital's renal dieticians to hand out to their food insecure patients.

This is collected on a weekly basis. Since August 2024 the Lions have received \$1280.00 plus non-perishable foods. In 2025, the renal dieticians have provided 129 hampers to 33 people receiving dialysis treatment in Nanaimo.

With the money that was donated, the dieticians were able to purchase staples as well as 47 Good Food Boxes, through Nanaimo Share. These Good Food Boxes are fruits and vegetables purchased at wholesale prices and packed by volunteers. Good Food Boxes provide over \$20 of fruits and vegetables for \$15.

Since healthy food is so important to Renal patients, these donations not only provide healthy alternatives, but also sustenance for food insecure patients. NBLC continues this in 2026.

## Central Saanich Lions Club

The club completed the annual Christmas Tree chipping program offered to the community. The chips are used by our municipality on park pathways.

At our first meeting in January we had a presentation from the Saanich Peninsula Hospital Foundation after which we presented them with a cheque for \$5000. We also installed 2 new members to the club.

January has also seen the continuation of our SPOT Vision Screening of the grade 3 students in the Saanich School District.

The Central Saanich Lions Club supports the Saanich Peninsula Lions Food Bank. Each month members provide between 100-150 hours collecting donated grocery items from major food chains, other organizations and local farmers. These are delivered to the food bank where volunteers sort the items for distribution. In addition, a member collects coin boxes from various locations around the community. In December this provided the food bank and additional \$4500. In December, we also assisted the Central Saanich, North Saanich, and Sydney Fire Departments with their food drives. This resulted in 23 pallets of grocery items and \$4000 in cash.



## Sequim Valley Lions: Toys for kids

Sequim does the holidays up right for big and little kids alike. Winter is a time for light, laughter and love, which was certainly spread throughout the crowds who participated in activities where Lions played a key role.

Starting early in the afternoon of November 29<sup>th</sup>, we welcomed Santa and the treelighting at Centennial Square, frosted our toy give-away booth and rounded out the evening with marshalling the Tractor Parade ( a new service project offered by the Sequim Chamber of Commerce).
