J.D. is married to Susan, a former (now retired) staff assistant teaching special needs children, mostly Asperger's or autism spectrum disorders. Susan and J.D. have two daughters. J.D. was a Division I varsity tennis player in college. He spent several summers playing in tennis tournaments and giving tennis lessons. His current hobbies include golf, music (saxophones, clarinet, electronic wind instruments), fishing and fly-tying, and he donates time building and maintaining websites for several non-profit, charitable organizations.

She has experience in working with clubs from rural, suburban and metropolitan areas and recognizes the unique struggles and needs for each.
